## **BACKGROUND ON**

### 16 JUNE 1976

On 16 June 1976, thousands of students gathered in Soweto, South Africa's largest township, in protest against the compulsory imposition of the Afrikaans language as a medium of education. The uprising ended tragically with hundreds of young people being brutally killed. This incident in many ways changed the course of the struggle for freedom and democracy in South Africa. It brought to the fore the atrocious acts committed by the apartheid Government and

its security forces against the black majority and propelled the United Nations to declare apartheid a crime against humanity.

In the ensuing years, South Africans supported by solidarity actions across the globe, waged a struggle against the apartheid system which eventually led to democracy in 1994.
